

# Nuttall announces retirement, leaves legacy at NCMC

As the 12th president to lead North Central Missouri College, Dr. Neil Nuttall has left his mark not only on the institution itself, but the staff, faculty, students and community, as well. With Nuttall at the helm, NCMC has thrived and maintained its competitive status in the higher education industry while also expanding facilities and services.

Prior to his departure in June, Dr. Nuttall took a moment to reflect on the past 11 years and visit a few of the locations on campus that have seen improvements during his tenure.





NCMC took possession of the R&K Glass property located at 12th and Mabel Streets during Dr. Nuttall's first year at the helm. The property was purchased from Ron Peterie through a gift left by the late Dorris Rider. Following demolition of the building, the area was filled, compacted and graded and today is the site of a large parking lot that serves Ketcham Community Center and the entire Trenton campus.



The mission of North Central Missouri College is to assist individuals in our educational/business community to attain their goals through open admission, reasonable costs, progressive curriculum and services-- delivered by a caring, competent staff in a safe, technology-rich learning environment. Under Dr. Nuttall's careful watch, each academic classroom was renovated and filled with state-of-the-art instructional aids. From ipads to Smart Boards\*, NCMC students have access to the latest and best technology.



Another major milestone for Dr. Nuttall was the development of the Barton Farm Campus in 2011. The campus is a 138-acre farm given to NCMC by the Elizabeth and Arthur Barton Trust to benefit the college's agriculture program. The farm is just south of Trenton on U.S. Highway 65, 3.5 miles from the main college campus and includes the Lager Laboratory of Plant & Energy Science, Wahn Greenhouse, Metcalf Mechanical Resource Center, Kuttler Animal Science Building and Whitley Natural Habitat Area. The campus serves as an applied learning environment that demonstrates agriculture production practices and the conservation of agricultural and natural resources. Courses in animal science, plant science and agriculture mechanics are offered here.

The construction of the Barton campus provided dedicated classroom and lab space for students in Industrial Technology and alternative energy related courses. New equipment purchased over the last few years allows students the opportunity to apply classroom instruction to hands-on applications in electricity, PLC's, motor controls, fluid power, 3D printing, and wind energy.

John and Delores Kutler presented a gift of a 312-acre farm in Buchanan County to NCMC in 2011. The farm, appraised at \$1.4 million, will provide the college with income for a maximum of 10 years and, at that time, the college will have the option to renew the lease or sell the farm. The funds are used to finance the operations of the Barton Farm Campus. The animal science building was named in their honor.





Construction of Dr. Albert and Vera Cross Hall occurred during Dr. Nuttall's tenure. Cross Hall is a 33,000 square foot brick and stone structure that houses allied health classrooms and labs, general theatre-type classrooms, and a commons area with a coffee shop.

"Since I have spent most of my adult life involved in healthcare, as have some other members of my family, we are most interested in this career field. Early in this program's history, nursing students rotated through my office to become acquainted with medical office practices. I had occasion to hire some of those nurses after their graduation. I found them to be well-trained, industrious, and excellent help."

The irony was too great not to share. It was the first day of my first College Reading class since being hired as an adjunct at NCMC in the fall of 2009, and Room 101 in Geyer Hall brought back a flood of memories. As I introduced myself to my students, I explained that I had attended first grade, three years of junior high and two years of junior college all in the building now known as Geyer Hall. In fact, the very room we were meeting in had been my first grade classroom in 1955 and the room where I learned to sew on buttons and whip up a pretty good chocolate cream pie in 1963. I wasn't met with the expressions of awe that I had anticipated, but I continued with my walk down memory lane.

As a first grader, I found that Central Elementary School (now Geyer Hall) was quite overwhelming. On my first day of first grade I walked into the building with the neighborhood children; we had been dropped off by one of our moms who was part of the neighborhood carpool. We preferred to walk to school, but our parents were afraid we'd never get there considering the horseplay that usually occurred with a group of children on a long walk. We did manage to walk home a few days a week, though, which meant a stroll through downtown Trenton. Jimmy and Joey Johnson were in charge of their little sister Kathy and me. The boys dared us to walk through the tunnel behind the Plaza Hotel and touch the mummy leg; we were terrified, but we were up to the challenge. (I later realized that the mummy leg was actually the dismembered leg from a mannequin.) Touching the mummy leg became a game we played on every walk home after that first time.

There were neighborhood elementary schools in Trenton at that time instead of one big elementary school for all of the students in town. A very large section of town, including my neighborhood near East Fourth Street, went to Central Elementary School. Besides Central, there was also Norton and Brainerd in the city limits and many country schools that generally educated students up to eighth grade. In those days, there were no school buses for town kids, and there was no need for organizing a pick-up line for car-riders because when the bell rang, most of the students ran out the doors and headed home on foot.

There was little talk about childhood obesity and fitness for children in the fifties and sixties. There was no need for public service announcements or fitness websites to remind us to play outside at least an hour a day. We got plenty of exercise without even making a conscious effort; our walk to and from school was better than recess or gym class. Some of us even walked home for lunch, which meant that we needed an hour for the noon meal rather than the short fifteen to twenty minutes allotted for school lunch today. Our parents made sure we started off with the appropriate hat, mittens, galoshes, raincoat—whatever the weather dictated for that day. Our en masse walk through town when school let out each afternoon was the best part of the day.

This "fun" continued as I finished elementary school at Norton since my family had moved across town when I was in second grade. This meant that throughout my junior high years, the walk was quite a bit longer. Attending school at the new Trenton Junior High, which was the old Central School, meant a mile walk across town for my neighborhood friends and me. Our parents usually dropped us off at school each morning as there were still no buses in town. I must say, I was always disappointed to see one of our mothers parked in front of Trenton Junior High to give us a ride home in the afternoon. There were few organized after school sports or clubs in those days, so our walk through downtown Trenton and down Ninth Street was our social time. Some of the best times in my life were experienced on those walks through downtown Trenton on my way home from school at Trenton Junior High. Perhaps some children were expected to walk straight home, but most of us took our time and enjoyed all that downtown Trenton had to offer. The first stop was Gizmos which was right across the street from the school. At Gizmos, students gathered around the jukebox while munching on French fries and guzzling frosty root beer in mugs. This was often a late lunch for those who skipped the school lunch, saving their quarters, the price for a hot lunch at that time. The French fries were twenty cents and a small root beer was a nickel, and it was much tastier than the greasy meatloaf served in the cafeteria. Other students rushed to Fair Drug Store or Cisco Brown Drug Store to snag a table or a place at the counter. Most of us could afford a cherry Coke or a single scoop of ice cream for a dime, and occasionally a chocolate soda or a hot fudge sundae for a quarter. On Fridays, there was a quick stop at Fudgy Davis' record shop to get the list of the top forty records for that week. The top forty lists were very important to my friends and me as we were very interested in the latest British bands. We, of course, loved the Beatles, but there was also the Dave Clark Five, Herman's Hermits and Paul Revere and the Raiders to name a few of the more popular bands.

As we slowly made our way home, there was considerable window shopping to be done along Main Street. Besides the three drugs stores, there were also three jewelry stores, two shoe stores, three dress shops, two dime stores, and even a couple of grocery stores and cafes. With three department stores (Montgomery Wards, J.C. Penney, and P.N. Hirsch), not to mention Western Auto and Trenton Hardware, residents could find almost anything they needed in downtown Trenton. These businesses moved or changed names from time to time, but for the most part, downtown Trenton was a prosperous place.

After graduating from Trenton High School in the second graduating class to attend the "new high school" at its present location on Oklahoma Avenue, I enrolled in Trenton Junior College as did about half of my classmates. And here I was again, walking the halls of Central School which had not yet been named Geyer Hall. The stately old school was now simply called Trenton Junior College. There were just over 200 students enrolled in 1970 when I was a freshman. Trenton Junior College felt very much like an extenuation of high school at that time. There was no Cross Hall, Hoffman Hall, bookstore, dormitories, ARC or Barton Farm Campus. It was just the one building, but it was a definite improvement over the previous location of TJC on the top floor of the old high school on Ninth Street which later became Adams Junior High.

The students at TJC hung out all day on "campus," playing cards and chess in the "student lounge" between classes. There were many organizations and activities for students at that time. Besides Phi Mu Epsilon and Phi Theta Kappa, there was basketball, golf, a pompom squad, cheerleading, drama club, TJC Singers and the newspaper and yearbook staff. There was also a prom-like dance in the spring. I loved my time at Trenton Junior College. I was still sitting in classes with my friends from high school, but I was also making new friends from neighboring towns. Now we were all TJC Pirates, and there was no doubt of our loyalty to Trenton Junior College.

Over the years, I have taken classes at other universities--to obtain a BS in elementary education (Truman University), an MS in Reading (Northwest Missouri State) and a graduate certificate in writing (Missouri Western), but I still maintain that I had my best college experience at Trenton Junior College (NCMC). Instructors like Tom Brown, Don Dalrymple, Sarah Caldwell, Louis Pushkarsky, Ron Rose, Gerry Frankenfeldt and Bill Ausmus made a huge impact on the students they taught and mentored in the "new" Trenton Junior College building. C.F. Russell and Ed Geyer were the administrators, and Bill Ray served as both Superintendent of Schools for Trenton R-9 and as college president.

After retiring as a middle school English teacher in 2009, I realized I wasn't yet ready to give up teaching altogether, so I gladly jumped at the opportunity to be an adjunct at the school where I had my first college experience. I felt very little apprehension about my first day as a College Reading instructor considering my familiarity with Room 101 of Geyer Hall. In fact, it felt very much like coming home!

# Online Learning at NCMC

**O**nline education is a rapidly expanding choice for students. According to the Babson Survey Research Group, over 7 million American students currently take at least one online course and three million students are enrolled in fully online programs. It is obvious that online education is a very popular way to get a college education. This shift to online learning is also true for our students at North Central Missouri College. While online coursework makes up 25% of the coursework offered by the College, 35% of the credit hours generated are online. In addition, 25% of our dual credit students are taking their courses online. Clearly, online learning is a significant part of higher education in Northwest Missouri.

CONVENIENCE and FLEXIBILITY are the reasons most often cited for taking online coursework. course. Online courses can be more difficult than The "traditional" college student has changed. Visit on their own time is critically important. The cost of college means that many students must continue working. Online courses may be the only option for these students to complete their education.

With the increased demand for online courses and programs at NCMC, there has been a demand for increased quality. Online instructors are being trained to utilize best online teaching practices in higher education. The course learning objectives, assessment of that learning, and course instruction are all being aligned. Our online Learning Management System (Blackboard) has been updated and revised for a consistent look across courses which eases navigation through courses for our students. Instructors are searching for alternatives to traditional textbooks and resources along with adding technological tools to enhance the online learning experience. With this increased quality, I believe there will be even more demand for online courses.

However, not everyone does well in an online Having the option of taking online classes and studying our website to see if you are a good candidate for online learning.



Over the past few months, a new curriculum has been designed to aid our students with a more streamlined academic approach to the programs. The changes are tentatively planned to begin fall of 2016.


Did you know that we have more than one

nursing program? The practical nursing program is an on the market, SimMan 3G. SimMan is able to talk 11 month program. After completing this program, the student may take a state board exam to receive their mistakes they may make at the bedside. According licensure as a practical nurse (LPN). This program is offered on the Trenton and Maryville campuses. After completing a practical nursing program, a LPN may attend the associate degree nursing program and, upon completion, take a state board examination to receive registered nursing licensure (RN). This program is a 9 month program that is also offered on both campuses. Another fantastic alternative for LPN's is the associate degree nursing (RN) online program that we offer. The situation at the bedside. online program is taught through various technological resources that enables students to obtain course content ton or Maryville. The nursing faculty would be happy from their computer. While the student's courses are all online, this program does require students to be in clinical facilities or in one of our on-campus labs a few

times throughout the semester.

The nursing programs continue to implement innovative classroom and simulation technologies to support completion of the program outcomes.

Nurse educators are using various approaches to ensure students are able to take knowledge they have gained in the classroom and apply that knowledge when caring for patients at the bedside. A new innovation to nursing education is the use of patient simulators. These simulators can mimic many aspects of a "real" patient. NCMC's nursing department has one of the highest fidelity simulators

## College in the Process of Searching for New President

With the retirement of current President Dr. Neil Nuttall coming up in May 2016, the search for a new president for North Central Missouri College has begun.

As has been done by NCMC in years past, a Presidential Search Committee (PSC) was formed. Membership of the PSC consists of representatives of the college community, NCMC Foundation, Trenton R-IX Schools, business/industry/government, and the Head Start and WIOA programs. PSC co-chairs are Steve Busch and Diane Lowrey, members of the NCMC Board of Trustees, and the search coordinator is Vicki Weaver, secretary/clerk of the Board.

The PSC had its initial meeting on October 20, at which time co-chair Diane Lowrey reviewed the tentative timeline for the search process and detailed the group's responsibilities. The committee's task will be to provide a list of no more than ten semi-finalists to the Board of Trustees, who will narrow this group to approximately five for formal interviews. Hopefully, a new college president can be identified by March 2016.

The PSC compiled a list of nine Ideal Characteristics for the next president as well as contributed their thoughts about upcoming Challenges and Opportunities for NCMC. Suggestions made by current President Nuttall were incorporated into the Challenges and Opportunities, and these items were approved by the Board of Trustees on October 27. Minimum qualifications for the position were unchanged from the last presidential search, which was conducted in 2004:

- teaching experience in an institution of higher education
- administrative experience in an institution of higher education or an organization of similar complexity
- a master's degree (with a doctoral degree preferred).

Formal advertising began on November 3 with a tentative deadline for receipt of applications set for December 31. Unlike past presidential searches, most aspects of this search will be done on-line.

Ads were placed in the on-line version of The Chronicle of Higher Education, the American Association of Community Colleges' website, Jobs.mo.gov, higheredjobs.com, NCMC's Linkedin.com page, and



NCMC's Human Resources webpage and internal email system. Use of a quick link on the college's home page (see the picture above) leads visitors to an 8-page information packet about North Central Missouri College and the position of president. Also, full-color postcards were mailed to community colleges in 13 Midwestern states as well as to all public colleges in Missouri.

Forty applications for president of North Central Missouri College were assigned to committee members to be read and scored the first week of January. Assignments were made by the use of www.random.org, and each committee member was assigned eight or nine applications. Every application will be read and scored by four committee members. At a PSC meeting set for mid-January, no more than ten semi-finalists will be chosen. Then, the semi-finalists will be invited to Trenton for an interview with the committee. The committee's ultimate task is to provide a list of no more than five finalists to the Board of Trustees.

Formal interviews will be conducted by the Board of Trustees, along with other activities such as campus and community tours for the candidates and their spouses/ significant others. Public forums will also be held for anyone interested in the opportunity to visit with the candidates and then provide their input through an online survey process.





With a strong contingency of sophomores, the optimism for success in 2015 was high. The Lady Pirates were coming off of a season in 2014 where they missed a winning record by only one game, finishing at 21-22. Players and coaches alike were hungry to achieve that goal in the next season.

The Lady Pirates started off the season going 0-7, losing five of those games by one or two runs. Undaunted, the team notched their first win against Region XVI rival Crowder College in front of their home crowd. After the slow start, the Lady Pirates got on a roll winning 17 of their next 19 games, including a fifteen game winning streak. The streak broke a record for the longest winning streak in NCMC softball history. Amidst the remarkable winning streak, the team traveled to Tucson, Arizona for their Spring Break trip.

The Lady Pirates played seven games in four days in beautiful Arizona and went undefeated. More impressively, four of the seven games were won by a mercy rule and the team scored 53 runs in

NCMC received the #4 seed in the Region Tournament and faced Maple Woods in the first round. Disappointingly, the team could not get anything going and dropped the first game 4-1.



The Lady Pirates' tremendous season as a team was also accompanied by several individual accolades. Scotlin Hurley and Hailey Lowery were both selected as First Team All-Region for their positions. In addition, Rachael Grossman, Tierney Martin, Courtney Seymour, and Madi Trump were selected as Second Team All-Region. Academically, Jennifer Stock and Hailey Lowery earned Academic All-American and NFCA Scholar Athlete awards.



The spring of 2015 was bittersweet for the NCMC Baseball program. The team won 24 games in 2014 and entered the 2015 season with high expectations. The 2015 team looked to have the ability to win 30 games and after winning the season opener, a doubleheader versus Cloud County and Fort Scott, optimism was high. But the Pirates swooned quickly as they lost their next eight contests. The team rebounded after the losing streak, compiling a 23-32 overall record (17 one run games). The Pirates finished the season very strong, winning a school record 11 D-I Region XVI games.



The Pirates opened the Region Tournament with a 10-6 victory over Crowder College, then lost a 4-3 heartbreaker in 11 innings to Three Rivers CC. At the end of the season, sophomores Zach Cross and Turner Herbek earned Exemplary Academic All-American awards.

The 2016 Pirates look to continue to raise the bar. The team again has a goal of winning 30 games and also aims to eclipse the 11 win mark in D-I Region play. The 2016 team has 11 returning players which gives a good amount of leadership and experience to mix in with a very talented group of freshmen. Coach Donnie Hillerman noted: "The team appears to have a good deal of speed and athleticism. While the team pitched well in the fall season the offense was not on par with expectations and we had some defensive concerns as well. The team is working hard to improve in all areas. We believe we will be very competitive and we look forward to being back on the field this spring."

guard was the lone returner. Filling in the other starting spots were two transfers, Imani White from Omaha, NE, Narel Santos from Sao Paulo, Brazil Jackie Graham from Plattsburg, MO, and Nancy Berwanger from Princeton.

The lady pirates got off to rough start due to a very tough early season schedule. They went into Christmas break with a record of 6-10.





After break, the women began their region 16 schedule defeating MCC Penn Valley both at home and away, as well as Cottey College and Wentworth Military Academy. St. Louis, however, handed the ladies their only regular season loss in the second half of the season. The women were able to get revenge in the NJCAA Region 16 championship game beating St. Louis in overtime to claim the Region 16 championship. The Lady Pirates then advanced to the District P title game. Unfortunately, this was the end of the road for the ladies. They were defeated at North Arkansas.

Many postseason honors were awarded to these young women. Narel Santos, Brooke Parton, and Imani White claimed first team all-region honors. Nancy Berwanger, and freshman Madison Winters claimed 2nd team all-region honors. Coach Croy was named the Region 16 coach of the year for the 2nd straight season.

# BASKET

North Central Men's Basketball season will go down as one of the best seasons in school history. Led by Head Coach Steve Richman and Assistant Coach Jeremy Esry, the Pirates



set a school record for wins, going 22-7 on the year. The Pirates dedicated their season to former longtime Assistant Coach Richard Woods who passed away.

The North Central men started the season out on a strong note, beating two NJCAA Division 1 Junior Colleges on their way to a 9-2 record first semester. The men then continued their hot streak by going undefeated in the month of January. During that time, they were ranked as high as 10th in the nation in the NJCAA Season Polls. This was the first time ever that North Central's men were ranked in the nation and it is also a school record. The Pirates ended their season with a loss to Penn Valley in regionals, a team that would eventually go on to place 7th in the nation at the NJCAA National Tournament.

North Central was led by a strong group of sophomore returners, seven of the nine which went on to play their 2015-2016 season at four-year universities. Those sophomores included Avion Ashford, Andrew Berry, Jamin Brandt, Blake Johnson, Xavier Newson, Justin Seamon, Austin Taul, Tyrell Thirkield, and Jory Woodson. The Pirates also had four freshmen who contributed to their successful season in David Barton, Caleb Berry, Terrance Bush, and Reid Summers. NCMC hopes to continue their success from last season and build off of it for a Region Title in 2016!

## International Success

Missouri ranks 12th in the nation for hosting international students with an increase of 19% from the 2012-2013 academic year to the 2013-2014 academic year. Below are stories from recent international students.

Carlos Mercardo from the Dominican Republic graduated from NCMC with his Associate in Arts degree, transferred to Graceland University in Lamoni and graduated with a Bachelor's degree in Accounting. Below is Carlo's personal journey in his own words.

Going to Trenton was the start of my professional journey and baseball was what triggered the beginning of what I've become. NCMC's baseball program offered me the chance of having a great education, a better life, and the opportunity of meeting some of the greatest people I've known. When I first stepped in Trenton, MO, I barely spoke any English. I knew just the basics for a daily routine. As time went on, I learned more thanks to the NCMC baseball staff, teammates, classmates, professors and, best of all, the director of Admissions and coordinator of International Programs Karla McCollum. They all supported me through my first semester. During the summer, I was also very lucky to be part of the Vandevender family who took me in and helped me to speak proper English and treated

During the process of acquiring my Associates in Arts degree, I made the varsity baseball team, participated on local charity events and was part of the small but very united international student group that had a huge impact on me. The people from Trenton made me feel a part of the community and that's something that really made my time at NCMC a lot easier. Trenton felt so much like home to the point that when I went on my first trip back to Dominican Republic, I didn't feel like I was going to my real home. As graduation was approaching, I needed to line up the next school that I was going to attend to complete my 4-year degree in Accounting. There are many people to thank that made this start possible including Coach Donnie Hillerman, Coach Mike Overman, Karla McCollum and her family, the Vandevenders, the Ockenfels family, the awesome staff from the Baptist Student Union (BSU), my professors and, last but not least, the Brinser family. They all treated me like a son coming home.

Once I completed my studies in Trenton, I moved to Lamoni, IA where I attended Graceland University to complete my Bachelor's degree in Accounting. After finishing my BA, I was able to work for a full year as an Optional Practical in Training to acquire experience. That's when McClain Enterprises took me in as a Social Media Marketing Intern where I was assigned to work with a restaurant called "El Pico Mexican Restaurant" on the marketing and



a little of budgeting and finance side of it. This is located at the Independence Square in Independence, MO. Once the internship ended, I moved to Kansas City where I started working in the plaza area at Crestwood Services, LP in the Logistics Department as an assistant where I also worked with accounts payable and billing customers, among other tasks.

My working time in United States came to an end and I returned to the Dominican Republic where I found a job at a startup footwear manufacturing company called General Shoes DR, Corp. whose parent company is in New York and originally from China. You'd be surprised how small this world is since the general manager from this company was born in Kansas City and raised in Brookfield, MO. Mr. Rex Deming is now living in Santiago, Dominican Republic.

I started with this corporation as an Accounting Assistant to be able to grow with the company. I was then taken under the knowledge of the individual who was serving as the Director of Finance/Accounting until I was prepared enough to assume the position in February of 2015. Many things have happened since I became the Accounting/Finance Manager at GSDR and the experience has been nothing but amazing. I know there are many more experiences to come and that life wouldn't have been this way if I hadn't started at North Central Missouri College and, to be honest, I wouldn't have wanted it any other way.



#### Mutsa Majee's story

In 2009, North Central Missouri College enrolled its first international student, Mutsa Majee, from Zimbabwe. Mutsa's goal was to achieve an Associate in Arts transfer degree with an emphasis in Accounting. Though adjusting to the American education system and way of life were initially challenging, Mutsa was quick to learn the ropes and excelled in all her subjects. In her second year, she started tutoring other students in the Academic Resource Center. Mutsa used her spare time to volunteer at Green Hills Community Action Agency in addition to serving as an officer for Phi Theta Kappa chapter at NCMC. Over the years, it was pleasing to see

Mutsa grow into a productive student, one with a can-do outlook, who delivered high quality work. Mutsa was committed to living the values of NCMC. Following the completion of her graduate studies, she was hired as a Federal Tax Associate at KPMG LLP. And in May of 2015 had completed and passed all four examinations towards becoming a CPA.



North Central Missouri College students will soon have access to a new scholarship fund. The proceeds of the Jack Newman Young and Mildred M. Young Irrevocable Trusts will provide permanent scholarships for students at the college.

Teresa J. Cross, Director of the NCMC Foundation, said, "I want to express my gratitude on behalf of the Foundation to the Young family for their gracious gift of this endowed scholarship fund. It will provide many awards for our students in memory of Jack N. Young, his wife Mildred M. Young, and his parents Noble J. Young and Myra A. Young every year."

Mr. and Mrs. Jack Newman Young were farmers south of Gallatin. His father, Noble Jack Young, was the manager of the former Young Lumber Company in Spickard, Missouri. Mildred Young died in 1991 and Jack

Young passed away in 1999; they had no children. All the terms of their trusts have recently been fulfilled and the estates have been settled.

The bulk of the Youngs' estate was in farmland, which totaled more than 600 acres. The farmland sold at public auction this fall and the NCMC Foundation, the United Methodist Foundation, and Children's Mercy Hospital split the proceeds. These funds established the Young family endowed scholarship for NCMC students.

The Youngs' trusts were established during the time that Jack Derry, former Director of the NCMC Foundation, was managing its scholarship drive in the 1990's. The law firm of Miller, Seidel and Havens represented North Central Missouri College as the trust was developed and Commerce Bank of St. Joseph was the trustee.

College President Dr. Neil Nuttall commented, "As I reviewed various communications on file from the Young family, I saw that Jack Young wrote, 'I believe that North Central Missouri College is an up and coming source of strength for our community and I want to support its future.' To be sure, this wonderful gift will promote North Central Missouri College's mission for many generations as it provides financial assistance for our students!"

In addition to the scholarship funds from the Young estate, our *Gifts in Action Scholarship Campaign* has now added over \$141,800 for 2015/2016 which brings us to a total over \$595,800 since the kick-off of our campaign. The Foundation now has over \$3.5 million in endowed scholarship funds.
